

## Guidance on the Requirement of a Permit from the Spencer Conservation Commission

## How do I know if there are wetlands on my property?

The Town of Spencer's GIS map is a free resource available to the public that can be used for a variety of reasons, including identifying wetlands.

- 1. Visit <u>www.spencerma.gov</u> and select *GIS Mapping*, located under the Citizen Action Center section.
- 2. Type the address or property owner in the *Property Quick Search* field (top right). Select the desired address from the results below.
- In the top right corner of the map, select *Themes*. The *Base Themes* will be displayed on the left. Select *Wetlands*. The box will change from gray to blue. Use the key below to identify any wetlands on the property or surrounding area.
- 4. To estimate the distance from the wetlands to the proposed project site, select *Markup* from the menu on the top right corner of the map. The *Markup* menu tool will by displayed on the left. Select *Measure* and *Line*. You will then be able to draw a line to connect your two points (wetlands and project site).

## There are wetlands on my property. How do I know if I need a permit?

Anytime you plan to work within the 100-foot buffer zone of a Resource Area, or within the 200foot buffer zone of any waterway, you must obtain the necessary permits from the Conservation Commission as identified by the Wetlands Protection Act or the Spencer Bylaw. ## What type of permit application do I need?

They type of permit will vary based on the type of project, the amount of disturbance that will be caused, and its distance from the wetlands area. If you will be disturbing soil or vegetation 50' to 100' from a pond, wetland, or stream, a *Request for Determination* (RDA) may be sufficient. A *Notice of Intent* (NOI) will be required for projects that will disturb soil or vegetation in any of the following areas.

- 0 to 50 feet from a pond, wetland or stream
- Within 200 feet of a stream or river that flows year round
- In a pond, stream, wetland or river
